Mitacs funding opportunities

Mitacs Accelerate Fellowship

Master's students can complete an 18-month project (minimum \$30,000 stipend). PhD students can complete a three-year project (minimum \$72,000 stipend). The Fellowship also offers national professional development training that helps interns gain in-demand career skills and ensure the success of their projects.

This fellowship provides up to 3 years of funding valued at \$55,000 per year to undertake resarch with a company or not-for-project organization.

Ontario Graduate Scholarships

The Ontario Graduate Scholarship (OGS) Program recognizes academic excellence in graduate studies at the master's and doctoral levels in all disciplines of academic study. Students must apply for OGS at the institution where they are/or plan to be registered in a master's or doctoral program in 2019-20. The OGS is not transferrable.

Value: \$15,000 for one year (\$5,000/semester for three semesters)

JSPS Postdoctoral Fellowship

The Japan Society for the Promotion of Science has established the JSPS Postdoctoral Fellowships for Foreign Researchers. A limited number of promising early-career researchers are given the opportunity to conduct research in Japanese universities and in designated research institutions and laboratories. NSERC is responsible for recommending Canadian nominees for JSPS Postdoctoral Fellowships.

Students must be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident, not have Japanese nationality or be a permanent resident of Japan, hold or expect to hold a doctorate degree in one of the fields of research that NSERC supports prior to the proposed start date of the postdoctoral fellowship, not hold, or have held, any other JSPS Postdoctoral fellowship.
