Mitacs funding opportunities

Mitacs Accelerate Fellowship

Master's students can complete an 18-month project (minimum \$30,000 stipend).

PhD students can complete a three-year project (minimum \$72,000 stipend).

The Fellowship also offers national professional development training that helps interns gain in-demand career skills and ensure the success of their projects.

Accelerate Industrial Postdoctoral Fellowship

This fellowship provides up to 3 years of funding valued at \$55,000 per year to undertake research with a company or not-for-profit organization.

Austism Scholarships Award

A Scholar Awards Program in Autism has been established to ensure that Ontario attracts and retains pre-eminent scholars. Applicants are expected to create new knowledge concerning child autism, and its translation into improved health for children, more effective services and products for children with autism, and increase the province’s capacity in diagnosis and assessment of autism and a strengthened treatment system.

There is one award at the Master’s level (\$18,000 for 1 year) and one at the Doctoral level (\$20,000 for one year)

Ontario Women's Health Scholars Award

A Scholar Awards Program in Women's Health has been established to ensure that Ontario attracts and retains pre-eminent women's health scholars. Applicants will excel in the creation of new knowledge about women's health and its translation into improved health for women, more effective health services and products for women, and a strengthened health care system.

There three awards at the Master's level (\$25,000 plus \$1000 research allowance for 1 year), three awards at the Doctoral level (\$35,000 plus \$2000 research allowance for one year) and two awards at the Postdoctoral level (\$50,000 plus \$5000 research allowance for one year).

John Charles Polanyi Prize

In honour of John Charles Polanyi, recipient of the 1986 Nobel Prize in Chemistry, the Government of Ontario has established a fund to provide annually up to five prizes to outstanding researchers in the early stages of their career who are continuing to post-doctoral studies or have recently started a faculty appointment at an Ontario university.

The prizes have a value of \$20,000 each and are available in the areas broadly defined as Physics, Chemistry, Physiology or Medicine, Literature, and Economic Science.

JSPS Postdoctoral Fellowship

The Japan Society for the Promotion of Science has established the JSPS Postdoctoral Fellowships for Foreign Researchers. A limited number of promising early-career researchers are given the opportunity to conduct research in Japanese universities and in designated research institutions and laboratories. NSERC is responsible for recommending Canadian nominees for JSPS Postdoctoral Fellowships.

Students must be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident, not have Japanese nationality or be a permanent resident of Japan, hold or expect to hold a doctorate degree in one of the fields of research that NSERC supports prior to the proposed start date of the postdoctoral fellowship, not hold, or have held, any other JSPS Postdoctoral fellowship.
